LEGALIZING SEGREGATION, "SEPARATE BUT EQUAL"

FOR 40 years, S.C. Looked other way on unconstitutional anti-black laws in South

1896 - S.C hears case challenging segregation in the South IT RULES SEGREGATION IS LEGAL & DOESN'T VIOLATE 14TH AMENDMENT

This ruling ensures segregation & discrimination in South for 60 years protected by the law as Long as services are "equal"

The IMPORTANCE of the JIM OROW SOUTH

HINDERED RIGHTS OF MINORITIES BY

BASICALLY CREATED TWO AMERICAS: WHITE AND BLACK
FEDERALLY DENYING BLACKS THEIR NATURAL RIGHTS
FACILITATING RACIAL DISCRIMINATION UNTIL 1950S
LEAVING AFRICAN AMERICANS UNPROTECTED FROM
VIOLENT RETALIATION FOR RESISTING DISCRIMINATION
