War still raged in the Pacific, where the Allies were fighting their way toward Japan.

- Battles during the-hopping campaign were fierce, with high casualties on both sides.
- Kamikazes crashed into American ships. Japanese troops fought to the death.
- An intense bombing campaign leveled much of Tokyo. Still, Japan to surrender.

Early in the war, FDR had authorized scientists to develop an bomb. The top secret program was code-named the **Manhattan Project**. Now it was up to Truman to decide if and when to use it.

The Japanese refused to surrender.

- An invasion of Japan could cost up to American lives.
- Truman's chief priority was to save American lives.
- On August 6, 1945, U.S. pilots dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima.
- Three days later, they dropped a bomb on Nagasaki.
- On August 15, Emperor Hirohito surrendered.
